Welcome to the 2025/26 Season

At Scottish Opera, we know great art changes lives. This year we are thrilled to bring you a rich programme of opera at its best and boldest – international in scope, presented across the length and breadth of Scotland. 2025 marks ten years since Stuart Stratford joined Scottish Opera as our Music Director; during this time, his passion for opera in all its forms, and for involving everyone in its creation, has taken us to new heights.

We open with a double bill of Ravel's *L'heure espagnole* and Walton's *The Bear* at Lammermuir Festival and in Glasgow and Edinburgh. Puccini's *La bohème* returns in the vibrant Barbe & Doucet production that has delighted audiences the world over since its 2016 premiere at Scottish Opera. A concert of selections from *Eugene Onegin, Iolanta,* and *The Maid of Orleans* celebrates Tchaikovsky's characters and lyricism. 2026 opens with the world premiere of Dai Fujikura and Harry Ross' *The Great Wave,* exploring the life of iconic artist Hokusai alongside meditations on art, family, legacy, and the higher purpose of them all in our world. This co-production with KAJIMOTO is a must-see. In March, we present Wagner's transcendent *Tristan und Isolde* in a concert staging brilliantly envisioned by director Justin Way. Closing the Season is Sir Thomas Allen's exquisite production of Mozart's *The Marriage of Figaro*.

Touring opera across Scotland remains a top priority, and Pop-up Opera takes three mini classics on the road in Summer 2025. *Opera Highlights* returns with an Autumn 2025 and a Spring 2026 tour covering 35 locations, incorporating school and community workshops. Our Outreach & Education work continues to open hearts and minds and transform lives.

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Walton The Bear

Two caustic comedies of infidelity collide in this double bill that continues our long-running Lammermuir Festival partnership. Performed to mark 150 years since Ravel's birth, *L'heure espagnole* sees a turn from the melodramatic to the farcical. A clockmaker's serially unfaithful wife must come up with increasingly creative ways to hide her lovers over a series of quick-witted and quick-moving scenes.

The Bear, an adaptation of Chekhov's play, follows a widow's ostentatious commitment to her late husband – which sits at odds with his very public love affairs. But when a creditor comes knocking, the widow finds that it is never too late for a second chance at romance!

While the two composers' sound worlds are unique, they both probe the workings of imperfect human hearts with wry empathy. This concert staging of perfectly paired mini masterpieces is conducted by **Alexandra Cravero**, returning after her 2022 triumph with *Thérèse*. Director **Jacopo Spirei** and designer **Kenneth MacLeod** (*Opera Highlights* Spring 2025) interpret Ravel's and Walton's stories for a modern audience. The cast includes **Lea Shaw** (*The Makropulos Affair* 2025); **Chloe Harris, Jamie MacDougall**, and **Edward Jowle** (all *Trial by Jury / A Matter of Misconduct!* 2025); **Daniel Barrett**; and **Luvo Maranti**.

HAVANAISES

Love burns brightest on borrowed time. Opera's all-time classic heartbreaker is brilliantly envisioned by the creative minds of Barbe & Doucet (*Don Pasquale* 2024 and *Manon* 2009). In their vibrant production, the young bohemians' lives – rich in art, poor in cash – play out against the backdrop of 1920s Paris.

Puccini's sublime score never fails to cast its spell. His lush orchestration and exquisite vocal lines combine in some of the most ravishing music in opera. *La bohème* still has the power to transport audiences – it is easy to see how it has remained one of the world's most performed operas for 129 years!

A first-rate cast brings this tender, tragic, yet life-affirming story to life. **Hye-Youn Lee** (*La traviata* 2024) returns to play Mimì after originating the role in this production in 2017. She is joined by 'born bel canto tenor' (*New York Times*) **Mario Chang** in his Scottish Opera debut, **Roland Wood** (*The Makropulos Affair* 2025), **Rhian Lois** (*The Merry Widow* 2025), **Callum Thorpe** (*Oedipus Rex* 2024), **Edward Jowle** (*Trial by Jury / A Matter of Misconduct!* 2025), and **Jamie MacDougall** (*Trial by Jury / A Matter of Misconduct!* 2025).

Tchaikovsky's Heroines & Heroes Selections from

Eugene Onegin, Iolanta & The Maid of Orleans Discover Tchaikovsky beyond *The Nutcracker*. His powerful operas evoke historical epics, fairy tales, and everyday drama all with equal skill and emotion. Few dramatists in music or theatre have matched his skill in characterisation. Composing at a time of great change in music and the world at large, Tchaikovsky blended French and German Romantic influences with Russian traditions, finding a musical voice that remains unmistakable today.

In this concert, enjoy extended excerpts from three of his best operas, all of which centre around complex and richly characterised heroines. *The Maid of Orleans* is a romantic retelling of the story of Joan of Arc that the composer drew from various historical and fictionalised accounts, creating his own unique version of the young warrior-turned-martyr. *Iolanta*, Tchaikovsky's final opera, is a dreamlike fairy tale of a blind princess discovering the world outside her isolated garden home – and true love. The second half of the concert extracts the highlights of his masterpiece *Eugene Onegin*, a quietly heartbreaking tale of falling in love at the wrong time.

Conducted by **Stuart Stratford** with a cast including **Lauren Fagan** (*Ainadamar* 2022), **Josef Jeongmeen Ahn** (*Don Pasquale* 2024), and **Natalia Kutateladze** and **Robert Lewis** in their Company debuts, *Tchaikovsky's Heroines & Heroes* is a perfect night out this winter.

Dai Fujikura & Harry Ross The Great Wave Step into the story behind one of the world's most famous pieces of art in this bold world premiere. *The Great Wave* uncovers the story of Katsushika Hokusai and his daughter Ōi. Together, they redefined Japanese painting and printmaking – and changed the global art world forever in the process.

This large-scale, dynamic, international collaboration between Scottish Opera and KAJIMOTO builds on centuries of cultural exchange between Scotland and Japan – not least in Hokusai's influence on the Glasgow Boys and Charles Rennie Mackintosh at the turn of the 20th century, and his continued presence in pop art today.

Japanese composer **Dai Fujikura** and Scottish librettist **Harry Ross** create a mesmerising musical drama out of the artistic genius, financial struggles, and illicit trade that made the creation of *The Great Wave off Kanagawa* possible. The full forces of The Orchestra of Scottish Opera – with the unique addition of the rich historic sounds of a Japanese *shakuhachi*flute – under **Stuart Stratford** and the Chorus of *The Great Wave* vividly represent the collaborative nature of Edo-era printmaking. Directed by **Satoshi Miyagi** with set design by **Junpei Kiz**, costume designs by **Kayo Takahashi Deschene**, and props designs by **Eri Fukasawa**, the cast includes **Daisuke Ohyama** as Hokusai and **Julieth Lozano Rolong** (*Ainadamar* 2022) as Ōi.

Wagner Tristan und Isolde With only two performances, don't miss this chance to experience Wagner at his most intoxicating and transcendent. **Gwyn Hughes Jones** (*Tosca* 2019) brings his signature Tristan to Scotland, with Isolde portrayed by **Annemarie Kremer** in her much-anticipated Scottish Opera debut.

Justin Way, who directed six of Wagner's operas in concerts at the BBC Proms in 2013, brings his expertise to Scotland to probe the dramatic nuances of these fascinating characters, supported by Lizzie Powell's striking lighting design. The supporting cast includes Rosie Aldridge (*The Pirates of Penzance* 2013), Roland Wood (*The Makropulos Affair* 2025), Dingle Yandell (*Daphne* 2023), and Mark Le Brocq (*The Makropulos Affair* 2025).

Wagner's epic story of love, lust, and death – where a knight falls in love with the Irish princess betrothed to his king – takes a courtly Arthurian romance into a heady modern psychological space. Its 1865 premiere may have elicited moral outrage, but it quickly sparked a rabid fandom across the world. Wagner's revitalisation of the myth and his 'Tristan Chord', which resolves only at the end of the opera's four hours, have influenced generations of creativity, including the prints of Aubrey Beardsley, the films of Alfred Hitchcock and Lars von Trier, the performances (and heavy metal albums) of Christopher Lee, the writings of Nobel Prize winner Thomas Mann, and the film scores of John Williams and Hans Zimmer.

Mozart The Marriage of Figaro

Sir Thomas Allen revives his much-loved production of Mozart's unstoppable masterpiece. Reflecting the insight and experience of a seasoned performer, Allen's *Figaro* is full of humour, subtlety, and wit. **Simon Higlett**'s sumptuous designs provide the backdrop for a comedy of social revolution and subversion that is as relevant today as ever. This revival is presented in English, letting the laugh-out-loud comedy speak for itself.

All wedding days have their challenges. Few, however, compare to those faced by Figaro. The morning of the wedding unfolds with him having to defend the honour of his bride from the attentions of his master, Count Almaviva. Can Figaro and Susanna make it to their happily ever after?

Mozart's bubbling, energetic score – conducted by **Dane Lam** (*Carmen* 2023) shows his true theatrical genius for getting to the heart of each character. **Edward Jowle** (*Trial by Jury / A Matter of Misconduct!* 2025) is Figaro, with **Ava Dodd** as his betrothed Susanna; these roles are taken at select performances by **Emyr Wyn Jones** (*Oedipus Rex* 2024) and **Kira Kaplan** (*Trial by Jury / A Matter of Misconduct!* 2025). The main cast is rounded out by **Ian Rucker** making his Company debut as Count Almaviva, **Alexandra Lowe** (*The French Collection* 2024) as the Countess, and **Simone McIntosh** (*The Barber of Seville* 2023) and **Chloe Harris** (*Trial by Jury / A Matter of Misconduct!* 2025) as Cherubino.

RCS conducting collaborations

Stuart Stratford, a regular guest tutor at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland, and The Orchestra of Scottish Opera are training the next generation of conductors alongside the Conservatoire. RCS MMus conductors enjoy concerto workshop sessions with The Orchestra of Scottish Opera and RCS student soloists, under Stuart's guidance. The Company also recently began a new relationship with the Leverhulme Conducting Fellowship, facilitated through the RCS, with each year's Fellow gaining training and performance opportunities at Scottish Opera.

Across Scotland

Scottish Opera continually engages with organisations, networks, audiences, and participants from a diverse range of backgrounds, with the goal of improving quality of life and access to the arts.

These projects, all new or expanded for the 2025/26 Season, show a snapshot of Scottish Opera's dedication to bringing creativity, expression, and personal and professional development to the people of Scotland.

Glasgow 850

A chorus of 300 children from across Glasgow's schools perform *Built on the Clyde*, a mini-opera with lyrics by **Allan Dunn** and music by **Alan Penman** that celebrates the iconic river's rich contribution to Scotland's largest city on its 850th Anniversary. Premiered during the opening night of a three-day music event celebrating Glasgow's anniversary year, *Built on the Clyde* will subsequently be available as a free digital resource pack for all Glasgow primary schools. Scottish Opera & NHS Lothian Chorus

In spring 2025, after several successful community opera and community chorus performances, Scottish Opera launched a new Community Chorus in Edinburgh for NHS Lothian staff, in partnership with Tonic Arts and NHS Lothian. The chorus sings a mix of opera, classical, and popular music and is open to all NHS Lothian staff regardless of previous experience. The Scottish Opera & NHS Lothian Chorus focuses not only on musicmaking but also acting, choreography, and other performance elements needed onstage in an integrated, music-led drama, aiming to develop participants' confidence in performing.

Children's Chorus

In summer 2025 Scottish Opera launches a Children's Chorus for ages 8-11 led by Chorus Director Susannah Wapshott and the Company's Outreach & Education team. The Chorus members not only learn music and singing through the Kodály method but also stagecraft, performance skills, and choreography. This year-round programme of activity focuses on building the young participants' skills, confidence, and passion for opera, an art form that combines singing and orchestral music, drama, visuals, and movement. As their confidence develops, the chorus members will experience a range of performance opportunities from specially commissioned music theatre pieces to opportunities to be considered for children's roles in Scottish Opera mainstage productions.

Music Schools Partnerships

Scottish Opera expands its partnerships with key specialist music schools across Scotland. In 2025/26, Aberdeen City Music School at Dyce Academy joins St Mary's Music School (Edinburgh) and the Music School of Douglas Academy (Glasgow) where Scottish Opera professionals support and mentor young singers exploring opera as a career. The aim is to bolster arts industry career pathways and support the classical music industry in Scotland.

Developing the Young Workforce

Working from recently identified gaps in the Scottish Arts Sector, Developing the Young Workforce seeks to not only train people entering the workforce in necessary industry expertise but also to bolster resilience, empathy, compassion, and other essential life skills that facilitate a successful and enduring career in the arts. As a national performing company, Scottish Opera is committed to ensuring the national professional pipeline is strong and sustainable for this generation and the next generation of arts workers. This programme provides structure, support, and development opportunities alongside upskilling training. Over the course of the 2024/25 Season, over 200 participations were recorded with students from the City of Glasgow College, who gained valuable professional experience and insight across the Company's departments and operations.

Hires and co-productions

Scottish Opera reguarly collaborates with other international opera companies to maximise resources and create world-class opera. 2025 and 2026 see co-productions with Opera Holland Park, D'Oyly Carte Opera, The Metropolitan Opera, Welsh National Opera, Houston Grand Opera, Opera Ventures, Théâtre National de l'Opéra Comique, and Adelaide Festival as well as the world premiere coproduction of Dai Fujikura's *The Great Wave* at the heart of this Season. This KAJIMOTO coproduction is unique as it not only increases our resources and reach but also provides special training opportunities for young Japanese arts professionals, continuing Scottish Opera's commitment to the arts workforce of the future on a world scale.

Opera Australia at EIF

In August 2025, Opera Australia brings their acclaimed production of Gluck's *Orpheus and Eurydice* to the Edinburgh International Festival. Scottish Opera is refitting costumes and making scenery and props, and a local professional chorus, led by Scottish Opera's Chorus Director **Susannah Wapshott**, performs alongside soloists from Opera Australia and the Scottish Chamber Orchestra.

Josefine

The UK's first newly commissioned opera for animation – produced by **Gemma Dixon**, animated by a team headed by **Sophie Bird**, directed by resident filmmaker **Antonia Bain**, composed by former Composer-in-Residence **Samuel Bordoli**, with a libretto by Bain and Bordoli – had a triumphant run at film festivals around the world in the 2024/25 Season. *Josefine* won awards in Mannheim and Messina and has played from New York to Vienna. The UK premiere was held at Northampton Film Festival on 8 March 2025, with the Scottish premiere on 21 March in Glasgow. In 2025/26, *Josefine* makes its South American premiere and will soon be available to view at home.

Celebrating 10 Years of Stuart Stratford

Opera is a vital and dynamic art form, weaving together storytelling, music, and theatrical spectacle to captivate and move audiences. Whether through heart-wrenching tragedy or exhilarating drama, opera in Scotland continues to inspire, challenge, and transport audiences to new worlds. Here's to the next decade!'

Starting with Janáček's *Jenůfa* in 2015, Stuart has championed opera in all its forms across Scotland and continues to make it his mission heading into his second decade as Scottish Opera's Music Director. He has conducted the UK staged premiere of Osvaldo Golijov's *Ainadamar*, the Scottish premiere of Richard Strauss' *Daphne*, the European premiere of Missy Mazzoli's *Breaking the Waves*, and the world premiere of Stuart MacRae's *Anthropocene*. His enthusiasm for community opera has led to large-scale productions of Leoncavallo's *Pagliacci*, Bernstein's *Candide*, and Stravinsky's *Oedipus Rex* with dozens of local non-professional chorus members. With the Sunday Series and the Composer Collection concerts, he spearheads a Company-wide exploration of hidden gems close to his heart from across the repertoire, complementing Scottish Opera's more popular repertoire and ensuring audiences in Scotland can hear these rare pieces close to home.

The Small Magician

A trauma-aware, inclusive, accessible vocal education resource, The Small Magician enables participants to challenge and build their vocal technique and knowledge healthily from the comfort of their own home or chosen space, helping them embrace their speaking and singing voice. Created by former Scottish Opera Emerging Artist, Associate Artist, and Education Artist-in-Residence Lea Shaw, the project offers guided practice sessions to help participants understand their voices, reduce the impacts of stress, and foster a growing sense of calm and wellbeing in daily life. The guidance draws on classic pedagogy, scientific research, and yoga and embodiment practices. Workbooks and resources can be accessed through scottishopera.org.uk/the-small-magician

Breath Cycle

Breathing techniques practised by professional opera singers can help those living with Long COVID and other respiratory conditions. This programme, formed with the Respiratory and Cystic Fibrosis Medicine team at NHS Glasgow, aims to strengthen mental health, wellbeing, and respiratory health. Now in its fourth consecutive year and recently nominated for the 2025 Classical:NEXT Innovation Award, the response is overwhelmingly positive, with participants citing improvement in breathing, energy levels, and mood. Anyone looking for support can practice with free exercises on demand, sing along with the Covid Composers Songbook – written by participants about their experience living with Long COVID - or register to take part in weekly online sessions.

Returning by popular demand is *The Giant's Harp*, an interactive educational singing workshop and performance pairing for pupils in P3 and P4. It has been created by mezzosoprano **Lea Shaw** and harpist **Sharron Griffiths** and directed by **Emma Doherty** to introduce children to the beautiful music and versatility of the harp. Using the 18th-century fairy tale of Jack and the Beanstalk, which features a magical singing harp, youngsters learn about the long history of this instrument and the many continents and cultures where it can be found through singing, movement, narration, puppetry, and of course music familiar and new.

Primary Schools Programme for 2026

Scottish Opera's children's operas make learning hands-on, fun, and creative. Over the years, the Primary Schools Tour has inspired over 850,000 children across all 32 Local Authority areas. This year's show is *Dragon of The Western Seas*, a Scottish Opera original from 2018 with music by **Alan Penman**, words by **Ross Stenhouse**, costume design by **Trish Kenny**, and art design by **lain Piercy**.

For 2026, the team are delighted to announce some exciting new changes to the much-loved primary schools' programme that will enable even more schools to engage with this awardwinning cross-curricular experience:

The Live Tour

This is an incredibly popular choice for schools across Scotland. Using the digital resources, teachers prepare their pupils for a wonderful day with artists from Scottish Opera, who rehearse the production with the pupils before a fully costumed performance for family and friends.

NEW: Supported Digital Package

This option is a hybrid learning and teaching experience. Designed to guide teachers through the practicalities of organising and staging the production themselves, it incorporates an online CPD workshop full of hints and tips on the best way to use the digital resources to prepare pupils, followed by an in-person rehearsal session with one of our animateurs in the weeks prior to the performance.

On-Demand Digital Package

This self-guided pack for teachers allows them to stage the performance on an optimal date in a busy school calendar. Using the same resources (including ideas for making pupils' costumes), schools can access the materials at any time, preparing their pupils to a timetable that fits around existing curriculum demands.

Digital secondary schools resources

The Elixir of Love: Three Ways to Stage an Opera is a free teaching resource for secondary schools. Pupils explore Donizetti's comedy through three different interpretive stagings to learn about music, drama, and art and design – incorporating history, storytelling, and critical thinking.

Disney Musicals in Schools

Disney Musicals in Schools collaborates with primary schools facing challenges in engaging with the arts. Teaching Artists guide pupils through rehearsals for special adaptations of Disney musicals and, crucially, provide training for teachers to build their pupils' skills and confidence through the performing arts, creating a sustainable arts legacy for the future. Scottish Opera is Disney Musicals in Schools' first Scottish partner, and this fifth successful year of the programme is the second year to engage with Additional Support Needs Schools. Through this collaboration, Scottish pupils have had the opportunity to perform the UK 'premiere' of Frozen in schools, with the 'premiere' of Moana on the horizon.
