Welcome to Scottish Opera's 2024/25 Season

In our 62nd year, we are delighted to continue our commitment to accessible, entertaining, world-class performances with music from more than 11 composers in 56 venues the length and breadth of Scotland. We proudly present eight emotionally charged operas; three world premieres; two composer collections; our first animated opera; and a packed programme of touring, outreach, and education work.

Summer 2024 sees the world premiere of Karen MacIver and Jane Davidson's *RED* performed by our Young Company, and Stravinsky's *Oedipus Rex* at the Edinburgh International Festival. Next, Britten's *Albert Herring*, directed by Daisy Evans, opens at the Lammermuir Festival before performances in Glasgow and Edinburgh, alongside Renaud Doucet and André Barbe's beloved production of Donizetti's *Don Pasquale*. A concert, *The Puccini Collection*, finishes 2024. In February 2025, Olivia Fuchs' thought-provoking production of Janáček's *The Makropulos Affair* comes to Scotland following its five-star run at Welsh National Opera. After *The Strauss Collection* in concert, the Season ends with Lehár's *The Merry Widow*, directed by John Savournin, together with a double bill of Gilbert and Sullivan's *Trial by Jury* and the world premiere of Toby Hession and Emma Jenkins' *A Matter of Misconduct!*.

While the 2024 Pop-up Opera tour finishes in early July, *Opera Highlights* travels across the country from January to March 2025. This Season it incorporates school and community workshops, continuing our unabated dedication to bringing opera to everyone in Scotland. *Josefine*, a brand-new animated opera short film by Samuel Bordoli and our in-house filmmaker Antonia Bain, takes our work to worldwide film festivals and soon to a screen near you.



EDINBURGH INTERNATIONAL FESTIVAL

An impressive community chorus from across the Central Belt joins Scottish Opera at the Edinburgh International Festival for this unique promenade performance, where Greek myth comes to life under **Roxana Haines**' (*Hansel & Gretel* 2023) insightful and innovative direction. The National Museum of Scotland's awe-inspiring Grand Gallery is a spectacular setting for classical drama, exceptional voçal performances, and Stravinsky's moving orchestral music.

Oedipus has been crowned King of Thebes, but the Oracle prophesises misfortune. Can he defy his future and outrun his fate? A cathartic exploration of identity, free will, and the human condition, *Oedipus Rex* celebrates the bravery and resolve with which humans can face their destinies — a timeless piece made anew for audiences today.

The cast includes **Shengzhi Ren** (*Daphne* 2023) as Oedipus, **Kitty Whately** (*Don Giovanni* 2022) as the queen Jocasta, and **Roland Wood** (*Marx in London!* 2024) as the scheming Creon.

LAMMERMUIR FESTIVAL, GLASGOW, AND EDINBURGH

The market town of Loxford is just as busy with gossip as it is with trade. Lady Billows, organising the annual May Day festival, is alarmed when her housekeeper informs her not a single young lady has a spotless reputation worthy of the May Queen. The answer? Crown Albert Herring, a shy mother's boy, May King instead! Albert has not done anything wrong — indeed, he has hardly done anything at all. Suddenly in the spotlight, Albert finds himself caught between old-guard traditions and his fellow youngsters' freewheeling fun, with both parties quick to judge the odd one out.

Since its first performance in 1947, Britten's loose adaptation of a Guy de Maupassant short story has become one of the 20th century's most beloved operatic comedies. In this chamber production created for the Lammermuir Festival, award-winning director **Daisy Evans** (*The Telephone* 2020) and designer **Kat Heath** bring a colourful eye to this story of finding one's own path in life despite — or perhaps because of — misadventures along the way.

Its eccentric yet lovable cast of characters is brought to life by conductor **William Cole** and a cast of top UK singers alongside Scottish Opera's 2024/25 Emerging Artists. The cast is led by **Glen Cunningham** (*A Midsummer Night's Dream* 2022) as Albert, with **Susan Bullock** (*Candide* 2022) as Lady Billows and **Jamie MacDougall** (*Marx in London!* 2024) as the Mayor, Mr Upfold.

Don Pasquale runs a crumbling *pensione* with a chain-smoking chambermaid, an ancient porter, and a greasy cook for company. Determined to keep his fortune to himself — and to spite his nephew Ernesto — Pasquale decides to marry, but when he finds a bride, it turns out married life is not quite as straightforward as he expected...

Director-designer duo **Renaud Doucet** and **André Barbe** (*La bohème* 2017) bring Donizetti's quick-witted comedy to life with typically colourful and quirky style. Set in Rome at the cusp of the Swinging Sixties, the eccentric characters are given life in a world that is the perfect setting for a titanic clash of generations. Their highly successful production, which began life at Scottish Opera, has since entertained audiences in Miami, Genoa, Vancouver, and Toronto.

Fresh from his comic success in *The Barber of Seville*, **David Stout** returns to Scottish Opera in the title role,
with three Company debuts rounding out the main roles. **Stacey Alleaume** is Norina, the clever woman who attracts

Pasquale's attentions; **Filipe Manu** is Ernesto; and **Josef Jeongmeen Ahn** is the wily Doctor Malatesta. **Stuart Stratford** conducts The Orchestra of Scottish Opera
through this sparkling *bel canto* masterpiece.

NEW PRODUCTION

Hailed as an 'unmissable triumph' (*The Telegraph*), this co-production with Welsh National Opera was nominated for a 2022 Southbank Sky Arts Award. Now, Janáček's mature masterpiece returns to Scottish Opera in its first full staging since 1993. The Orchestra of Scottish Opera under the baton of **Martyn Brabbins** brings out every dramatic nuance.

Emilia Marty, Elina Makropulos, E.M.; the stylish, enigmatic diva has lived many lives — and for over three centuries — in her quest to become a great opera singer. Captivating minds and hearts along her journey through time and across Europe, her existence throws up questions of science and nature, reality and fantasy, and life and death. But when the elixir she was given begins to lose its power, and when the poignant secrets of her lives and loves begin to come to light, she can no longer outrun these essential human tensions.

Olivia Fuchs' 'emotionally driven direction' (*The Telegraph*) is supported by Nicola Turner's multi-layered, poetic designs.

Orla Boylan (*Marx in London!* 2024) leads as Emilia Marty, with Brad Cooper (*Daphne* 2023) as Albert Gregor, Henry Waddington (*Greek* 2018) as Doctor Kolenatý, and Mark Le Brocq (*Nixon in China* 2020) as Vitek. An English translation makes this psychologically astute story even more immediate.

NEW PRODUCTION

A lavish Parisian party is a grand occasion for dancing, drinking, and (in)discreet love affairs. But Baron Zeta — ambassador to the cash-strapped state of Pontevedro — has a slightly more serious matter on his mind. Among his party guests is Hanna Glawari, the glamorous Pontevedrian widow who has arrived in Paris to enjoy her late husband's immense fortune. Zeta cannot bear the thought of Pontevedro losing half its national wealth should Hanna marry a Parisian, so he sets the charismatic Count Danilo to the task of keeping tabs on her heart. Little does he know that they have quite the history...

John Savournin (Opera Highlights Spring 2022) brings his joyful directorial touch to Lehár's waltz-filled charmer, with celebrated stage designer **takis** bringing his signature visual dynamism to the romance. A new English translation by Savournin and David Eaton makes the opera's wit sparkle. This co-production is seen at Opera Holland Park later in summer 2025, spreading this ultimate romance of second chances to even wider audiences after its Scottish tour.

With a cast to be announced later in 2024, there are more opportunities to learn about *The Merry Widow* and support the production through Scottish Opera's 'Play A Supporting Role' Appeal before it closes the 2024/25 Season.

The Orchestra of Scottish Opera The Chorus of Trial by Jury / A Matter of Misconduct!

A sprightly double bill exploring the malleability of truth and justice comes to life alongside *The Merry Widow*. With a comic cast performing contrasting roles in both pieces, it promises an unmissable night of classic G&S comedy and new writing — two pillars of Scottish Opera's output.

Premiered in 1875, the first major hit from the partnership of WS Gilbert and Arthur Sullivan is set around a classic case of broken vows — the defendant having literally left the plaintiff at the altar. The jury's sympathies are divided in a case that bubbles over with emotion, humour, and downright chaos: how will they decide between the charming yet rakish defendant and the utterly captivating plaintiff?

Trial by Jury is accompanied by the world premiere of **Emma Jenkins** and **Toby Hession**'s satirical operetta *A Matter of Misconduct!*, set in the press room at Number 9 Downing Street. When a scandal threatens to break about the front runner in a bloody leadership campaign, a lawyer is needed to prevent information from reaching the press. Enter Sylvia Lawless from the firm Lawless, Lawless, Lawless and Crook who must find the loopholes. This modern take on scurrilous behaviour follows Jenkins and Hession's crowd-pleasing political satire *In Flagrante*, premiered on the 2023/24 *Opera Highlights* tour.

The Puccini Collection returns following its one-night-only engagement in Dundee in 2021 to mark the centenary of the great composer's death in November 1924. Soloists Sinéad Campbell Wallace (The Puccini Collection 2021 and Tosca 2019), Mykhailo Malafii, and Roland Wood (Marx in London! 2024) are accompanied by The Orchestra of Scottish Opera under the baton of **Stuart Stratford**.

Giacomo Puccini regularly features among the most popular and beloved opera composers – from his 1893 breakout success Manon Lescaut to his final magnum opus Turandot, not quite completed at the time of his death. The concert features favourite arias and extended excerpts from across his varied and vibrant career, from his rare earlier works Le villi and Edgar to glorious highlights from his mature masterpieces: the dramatic intensity of Tosca, the Wild West of La fanciulla del West, the heartbreaking romance of La bohème, and more.



Following the success of *Daphne* in 2023, Scottish Opera is delighted to present a concert spanning some of the finest music Richard Strauss ever wrote. The German composer's early 20th-century output shows the heights of his harmonic and dramatic daring, exemplified by the three operas in this concert — *Ariadne auf Naxos, Arabella*, and *Der Rosenkavalier*. The first half moves between a clash of artistically opposed theatre troupes in *Ariadne* to a nostalgic Viennese romance complete with disguises and mistaken identities in *Arabella*. The second half captures the highlights of *Der Rosenkavalier*'s three acts, tracking two colliding love stories with all the complications and grandeur of human relationships.

Stuart Stratford conducts The Orchestra of Scottish Opera through these lush sound worlds. The all-star cast includes sopranos **Helena Dix** and **Rhian Lois** (*La bohème* 2020), mezzo-soprano **Hanna Hipp** (*Kátya Kabanová* 2019), and baritone **Roland Wood** (*Marx in London!* 2024), all making the most of Strauss' astounding understanding of the human voice.

An orphaned girl defiantly alone in a wood. A young woman determined to survive in her tower. A queen jealously protective of her empire. And an old woman using her wisdom to break the cycle. All are connected and defined by their striking red hair.

The fairy tales famously recorded by the Brothers Grimm and frequently re-told over centuries often cast their women in four archetypes corresponding with ages and stages of life: girl, maiden, mother, crone. *RED* is an interwoven story examining the circular, metamorphic nature of these tales as well as experiences shared by generations of women across time through dark comedy and magical realism. *RED* questions, yet ultimately affirms, the impact a single person can have in the wider world.

Full of comedy and pathos and charting a path from the abstract to the absurd, this world premiere is written by award-winning composer **Karen MacIver** and **Jane Davidson MBE**, Scottish Opera's Director of Outreach & Education. Together, they create a timeless, bold, expressionist world where women's power is subject to scrutiny and alienation.

Flora Emily Thomson (*Maud / Down in the Valley* 2023) directs and SOYC Artistic Director **Chris Gray** conducts a cast of 14 young performers as they chart this vibrant journey.

WORLD PREMIERE

After the success of 2020's live-action opera short, The Narcissistic Fish, Scottish Opera is excited to present its first-ever animated opera short, Josefine.

This 14-minute film, inspired by Franz Kafka's last short story 'Josefine the Singer' and produced in partnership with Maestro Broadcasting, is directed by Scottish Opera's resident filmmaker Antonia Bain and composed by former Emerging Artist Composer-in-Residence Samuel Bordoli, with a libretto co-authored by the pair. The soundtrack features 2022/23 Emerging Artist Zoe Drummond, a chorus, and The Orchestra of Scottish Opera conducted by Susannah Wapshott.

By combining the mediums of opera and animation, Josefine promises a new and exciting way to experience and explore both art forms. Josefine takes place in a desert world designed and animated by a team headed by **Sophie Bird**. Here, a creature's unearthly voice attracts sprites who are enthralled by it. The piece explores the complicated relationship between the singer and audience and the ever-more-relevant question of art's place in times of crisis. With confirmed screenings at the Film Festival at Vienna's Rathausplatz in summer 2024, as well as other dates to be announced, Josefine is coming soon to a screen near you.

Across Scotland

Scottish Opera continually aims to increase its reach in terms of numbers and geographic spread by engaging with organisations, networks, audiences, and participants from a diverse range of backgrounds and with the goal of improving quality of life for everyone.

Scotland's five National Performing Companies reached over 500,000 people in their 2022/23 Seasons. Central to all the Companies' work is engagement with five key demographics and communities: early years and primary school children, young people aged 11-24, communities and local government, the creative and cultural sectors, and international cultural relationships. The following projects show a snapshot of Scottish Opera's dedication to the people of Scotland.



Opera in Schools

Since 1971, Scottish Opera's Primary Schools Tour has engaged over 850,000 children across all 32 Local Authority areas. There is also always an opera on the annual Pop-up Opera tour created especially for primary school pupils, and opportunities to attend fully staged performances for free. See pages 32-33 or below for more information.

Music Schools Partnerships

New for 2024, Scottish Opera partners with St Mary's Music School and the Music School of Douglas Academy to support, mentor, and increase the numbers of young singers exploring opera as a career. A notable focus for 2024/25 and beyond, based on recently identified gaps in music education and career progression, is on those already attending one of Scotland's Specialist Music Schools.

RCS Artist Diploma in Opera

Starting in 2025, the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland introduces a one-year Artist Diploma in Opera in collaboration with Scottish Opera to offer a highly specialised combination of vocal, movement and acting training.

Breath Cycle partnerships

Breath Cycle has grown from its original work with cystic fibrosis patients to include those recovering from Long COVID, then developing further to offer broader wellbeing support. This year, Scottish Opera partners with leading experts at University of the West of Scotland and Chest Heart & Stroke Scotland to further develop Breath Cycle alongside evolving understandings of lung health and its associated health concerns. Free and subsidised tickets

Scottish Opera offers free and subsidised tickets to its performances for school groups; those under 26; and groups such as FanzClub, Highland Multicultural Friends, and The Welcoming that support refugees and asylum seekers to access the arts. In 2023/24, over 500 free tickets were issued to help welcome people to Scotland.

Festival of Politics

On 23 August 2024 the Scottish Parliament hosts its 20th Festival of Politics in partnership with Scotland's Futures Forum and Healing Arts Scotland. Featuring sessions on political, social, and environmental issues, the festival offers people an opportunity to discuss current affairs. Scottish Opera is thrilled to present *In Flagrante*, a short operatic political satire premiered on the 2023/24 *Opera Highlights* tour, in a performance at 3pm as part of the festival.

The world's first nationwide Healing Arts campaign unites organisations across culture, science, health, education, and government. A week of performances, exhibitions, and workshops begins at the EIF on 19 August 2024. Scottish Opera performs in Glasgow on 21 August.

This Season sees co-productions with Welsh National Opera, Opera Holland Park, and D'Oyly Carte Opera. Gilbert and Sullivan's The Gondoliers— Scottish Opera's 2021 co-production with D'Oyly Carte and State Opera South Australia – is available to watch on BBC iPlayer. In autumn 2024, Osvaldo Golijov's *Ainadamar* is performed at the Metropolitan Opera, the last of its coproducers to perform the production originated at Scottish Opera after Welsh National Opera and Detroit Opera. In spring 2025, Missy Mazzoli's Breaking the Waves opens at Houston Grand Opera in a co-production of Houston Grand Opera, Opera Ventures, Scottish Opera, Théâtre National de l'Opéra Comique, and Adelaide Festival that began life in Scotland.

The Small Magician

A trauma-aware, inclusive, accessible vocal education resource, The Small Magician enables participants to challenge and build their vocal technique and knowledge healthily from the comfort of their own home or chosen space. Created by former Scottish Opera Emerging and Associate Artist **Lea Shaw**, the project aims to empower participants to embrace their voices as part of a wider sense of wellbeing and an awareness of mental/physical health. The guidance draws on classic pedagogy, scientific research, and Yoga and embodiment practices.

Breath Cycle

Breathing techniques practised by professional opera singers can help those living with Long COVID and other respiratory conditions. This programme, formed with the Respiratory and Cystic Fibrosis Medicine team at NHS Glasgow, aims to strengthen mental health, wellbeing, and respiratory health. The response is overwhelmingly positive, with participants citing improvement in breathing, energy levels, and mood. Anyone looking for support can practice with free exercises on demand, sing along with the **Covid Composers Songbook** — written by participants about their experience living with Long COVID — or register to take part in weekly online sessions.


